

I live with my family and my dog in the Nilgiri mountains in South India. We live in a small village. There is a big forest around our village, but a small new road too. Come and visit my family!“

2. Mysore

After 3 hours you arrive in Mysore. Mysore is a small city. Many tourists want to visit the famous palace. Do you like to visit the palace?



3. Mudumalai Tiger Reserve

Take a bus or taxi to Gudalur in the Nilgiri mountains.

The journey from Mysore to Gudalur in the Nilgiri mountains is very interesting. You pass big forests and the Mudumalai Tiger Reserve. Maybe you are lucky to see wild animals? But do not leave the bus, this is dangerous.

[5] Plastic free Nilgiri mountains: reuse, reduce, recycle

„I am Rahul. I am a teacher at the

Vidyodaya Adivasi School in Gudalur in the Nilgiri mountains.

Plastic waste is a problem. In former times almost all the household waste was organic. Now people use more plastic.

You can throw food behind your house – a cow will eat it. But to throw away plastic is a problem.



„11 students of our school formed the youth club Yuwa. They made posters and hung them right in front of the houses of 20 families. This was a big success. After one or two weeks people separated paper, plastic and food waste. You could not see plastic waste on the streets.“

„Hi. We are Badichi, Ramya and Anju. We study the Vidyodaya Adivasi School in Gudalur in the Nilgiri mountains.

There is no garbage collection in our villages. People burn the plastic or the plastic lies around. This is a problem.

We started a recycling group at our school. We collect the plastic waste from neighbours and take it to the Rotary Club in town. Then a lorry takes the plastic waste to a recycling factory.“

Text 1:

„Nilgiri“ is an Indian word and means blue in English: The Nilgiri mountains are the Blue mountains. In the photo to the left the distant mountains look blue.

The name „Blue mountains“ comes from a small flower: The blue and lilac Kurinji flowers colour the Nilgiris mountains blue and lilac – but only every 12 years.





Text 1:

About one third of the plastic in the world is packaging material. Which means that many of our plastic articles become waste soon.

People use a plastic bag for fruits or vegetables only for about 25 minutes. Millions of plastic bags become waste every day. Every year there is more plastic waste.

Half of the plastic waste in Germany is burnt. When you burn plastic you burn chemicals, which is not good for the environment.

Half of the plastic waste in Germany is recycled. This is good, but you need water and energy for recycling.

To avoid plastic waste is ecofriendly.

Text 2:

Plastic is bad for the environment. Why?

It contains oil and many chemicals.

Most of the plastic in the world finally swims in the oceans. There it takes a very long time to biodegrade or disappear. For example: An apple disappears in 2 months.

A cardboard box disappears in 2 months.

A plastic bag disappears in 10 to 20 years.

A plastic cup disappears in 50 years.

A bottle of plastic disappears in 450 years.

But plastic does not really disappear, it only gets invisible: The plastic gets so small that you can't see it. But it is still there in nature, and the fishes, whales or sea turtles eat it.
